Have you been watching any of those "home" shows where people are looking for a new home because their old home is too small, doesn't have an "open" design concept, doesn't provide enough entertainment area....the reasons go on and on for getting rid of the old and getting the new "home."

What is a real home? It's a place where you feel wanted and loved and safe...you know you belong there. A home can be one room, or it can be a mansion; it can be decorated with priceless antiques or with thrift store treasures. Regardless of its monetary value, or its decorations, it is a place where you can go to bed and sleep at night, without fear or watchfulness. You are at peace there.

For many animals at Animals in Distress, our Kennel of Hope is the first, the only "real" home many of its residents have known. 
A Good Time Was Had by All!

The Holiday Spirit is alive and well every day of the year at Animals in Distress ... A Sanctuary of Hope and Unconditional Love for those without hope

As you reflect on the year that is past, and on the upcoming year, take a moment to reflect on what your love and support have meant to the cats and dogs who find refuge at Animals in Distress. Nothing happens by just hoping it will. Hard work, dedication, prayers, AND money allow us to do the work that we do. Every dollar is precious, every dollar counts. So, you won't be getting any mailing labels, calendars, and other "gifts" in the mail from us. We need the money those items cost to save lives. However, we decided to send you a different kind of "gift"—one that you can't buy in stores, one that you don't return because it's the wrong size or color. Our gift to you is the many happy animals living at our shelter. They would not be alive today if not for YOU. A few of them are profiled in this Holiday Newsletter to reflect the kind of "gift" you make possible.

One such animal is Theresa, a dog who is part of a great love story. As you may remember, Theresa was a stray in the remote area of a public park for over 8 years, along with a companion dog we named Hero. Attempts to capture them were unsuccessful for 8 years until one day, they and their litter of puppies were caught. The puppies were little and cute, so they were placed by the people who trapped the family. But no one wanted Hero and Theresa. They were older, they were not well socialized, and they weren't the kind of dogs deemed "adoptable." Of the 57 animal shelters and rescues contacted, ONLY Animals in Distress agreed to save their lives.

Most people aren't as devoted to each other as these two were. For 8+ years, Hero had protected his family, even chewing off his gangrenous leg after being hit by a car. When Hero passed away. We all worried about how Theresa would react to losing her companion and protector. Our staff and volunteers have made a huge effort to spend time with her, to let her know that she is not alone or forgotten. She is spending the holidays—and the rest of her life —with us, loved and protected, thanks to those who make our sanctuary possible. She embodies the commitment of Love and Devotion better than many people do.

In the past few months, Theresa, now 18 years old, has been diagnosed with bone cancer. She was not given much time, maybe to the new year. When her time comes, she will be in the loving and devoted arms of the people who have cared for her for over a decade. She will not be alone or afraid or in pain: she will be loved and respected right up to her last breath. She will know unconditional Love until she is reunited with her Hero.

May those of you who have lost a loved one whose presence will be sadly missed this holiday find comfort in knowing how many lives you have helped to save.

Focusing on the good that we CAN do helps us to cope with the pain of loss when there's nothing more that can be done.





Update on Ginger

The kitten featured in last month's newsletter—the one needing surgery to fix a prolapsed rectum—is doing very well. No one would ever guess how close Ginger came to dying! He will spend this holiday season in our sanctuary, free of pain, clean and well fed, surrounded by Love. Another Rescue.. Another Gift of Life

A recent rescue involved a tiny dog found disoriented and scared on a country road where she had been abandoned. We named her Karen, after the wife of the man who rescued her from certain death.

Her mouth had a horrible odor, and her teeth were caked with decay and infection.

Our veterinarian removed 24 rotten, broken, and infected teeth. She is doing very well and seems quite appreciative to have no more excruciating pain every time she tries to eat something.

There's a wooden plaque in the entrance to our shelter that reads "Peace to all who enter here." Such a simple statement and yet it is so meaningful. Without peace, we suffer physically, emotionally, spiritually, and socially. The relationship between stress (lack of peace) and all of those problems has been proven over and over.

During the holidays, we celebrate family, community, good will, kindness, generosity—all those qualities that make everyone feel good about life in general and about others. Some people exploit the season by encouraging people to overspend, over indulge, over everything. Imagine what kind of stress is experienced by shelter animals who have lost homes, family, even their names. At Animals in Distress, our commitment to each animal we rescue is that they will find peace here. We make the same promise to all who enter our little "world."
