other and to all the creatures whose life we impact--IF we choose to see the potential and goodness in all of us. We want to share a letter from an elementary school student who sent this message:

A Story of Hope...Bob Hope, that is!



During Radiothon last year, a black cat was found dying in the street. He was missing his right rear leg, which limited his options, and he was also being picked on by the other stray cats in the neighborhood. He could not fight for food very well and was slowly starving. We originally named the cat Hope, but changed it to Bob Hope when we found out the cat was a male. Clearly, we were his only hope.

Black cats are always the last to be adopted from shelters, as are black dogs. And missing a leg kept him from appealing to some people because he made them sad to look at him, or they didn't want a cat with a disability.

The great thing about such rescues is that the animal doesn't know that it has a deformity or handicap just because, it's blind, 3-legged, etc. That's one of the great advantages animals have: they don't sit around lamenting what they don't have or weep over how they have been mistreated and

abandoned. They simply choose life over death, happiness over gloom, and hope over despair. There's a lesson in that for all of us.

Walking through our sanctuary and looking at the hundreds of lives there is a wonderful healing experience. Animals who have literally been through hell are alive and well: they are happy because they feel safe and loved.

One of our volunteers recently decided to adopt Bob Hope. That is certainly something that can happen when people spend time to get to know some of our shelter residents. Like people, every animal has its own personality, and it's so important to get to know an animal (or a person) before deciding to offer it a forever home. The person who fell in love with him works with handicapped people and said that she was drawn to Bob because he was missing a leg but had such an incredible personality and so much determination.

Like the elementary school student who wrote the letter on page 1 of this newsletter, saying animals are "cute" both inside and outside, this adopter saw so many positives in an animal some shelters might consider "unadoptable." An added bonus to this adoption is that Bob joined a home that already had a cat, a very shy and laidback cat. That cat is now so much happier and confident since he has Bob to inspire him not to be afraid any more.

The elderly lab mix with bone cancer that we wrote about in the last newsletter continues to do well, considering her condition. Her prognosis, while terminal, included the prediction that she would probably not see the new year. Well, with medication and lots of love and prayers, Theresa is still doing well.
