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What is in a Word?

When shelters and rescue organizations, as well as individuals, say that they "rescued" an animal, what do they really mean? The answer to that seemingly simple question varies dramatically. For example, if the animal is injured, will it get medical help? If it has a behavior issue, will it be rehabilitated ... or exterminated? If it has tested positive for feline leukemia or FIV, will it be allowed to live in a separate area away from negatively testing cats? If it is a newborn, will it be nursed around the clock for several weeks? If it is elderly, will it be discarded because "no one wants older animals"?

Those of us who have been doing "rescue" for many years/decades, especially at Animals in Distress, understand that some animals (like some people) go through horrendous things, both physically and mentally debilitating them to such an extent that their lives are in jeopardy. When we "rescue" them, we have one basic policy: we will do whatever we can to help them heal, both physically and mentally. None are discarded as unworthy of help. No life is considered more or less precious. Once these forlorn and friendless creatures are "rescued" by Animals in Distress, they have a home with us for as long as necessary - for life if we don't find them a loving, forever home. Words can be used to deceive or to reveal the truth. Here is the truth, which has been our operating principle since we were founded in 1977: we do our best for every animal rescued, with YOUR help. How that happens is through hard work and your support.

Our annual WAEB Radiothon devotes 100% of donations to rescue and rehabilitation of some of the most desperate and friendless cats and dogs-those who would probably not be saved otherwise. Our shelter is full of examples of those who have been "rescued" and helped, despite their limitations-blindness, mobility challenges, diabetes, heart conditions, feline leukemia, seizures, and so on. In this newsletter, we will discuss just a few of our rescues-but please remember that there are MANY more that we cannot discuss here due to space limitations.




So much in rescue work depends on timing. If we can get to an animal soon enough, we can prevent more suffering and help the animal before the odds of

survival become poor. A recent example of the importance of such timing is a litter of tiny kittens who had been deposited in the back yard of an elderly woman.

The kittens were very sick, with a bad upper respiratory infection that pasted their eyes shut and made breathing difficult. The mother cat could not possibly take care of her babies, and she herself was probably sick as well.

Sadly, the neighbor's dog killed one of the kittens, so the situation was desperate. We hurried to rescue the remaining kittens but found that another had died before we got there. The four surviving babies are now in a foster home, where they received baths and antibiotics. We were especially worried about the runt of the litter, but she has now started to respond well. These pictures show the kittens shortly after being cleaned up.



A little dog named Grim came to us after being discarded by his owner. Grim is a happy puggle but was neglected so badly that his mouth was in horrible condition. Broken and decayed teeth, red swollen gums - we have no idea how the dog could have eaten in that much pain. Just think how badly we feel if we have just one

toothache: his misery was unimaginable. In fact, dental neglect is one of the main reasons that pets develop other, related problems like kidney, liver, and heart conditions. The infection drains from the teeth and causes organ problems. And that doesn't factor in the constant pain.

This newsletter is being written as Grim is recovering from surgery to neuter him as well as extract 9 teeth and perform a major dental. He is now on pain medicine, antibiotics, and soft food until he heals.

In the cases of the kittens and Grim, we were able to help them in time to save them, to give them a chance to live. Although sometimes we can't save an animal, we console ourselves with the thought that we can save most. At least, we tried—with your help.

Many of the animals featured in last year's Radiothon are doing well. Several have gotten homes. And some are ready to be adopted when the right family discovers them! The bottom line is this: RESCUE at Animals in Distress is a commitment that we have honored for 44+ years. And never forget: YOU make all of that possible.
