
to save lives, not to fancy offices, expensive mailings and television commercials, costly events, and executive salaries.

Memorial Day Reflections

YOU Are the Author....

Whether we realize it or not, we are authors of life. Each living being has its own story, a beginning, a middle, and an end. When we come in contact with others, they are helping to write our story, and we are helping to write theirs. If we transfer that idea over to animal rescue, we can see that our efforts to save animals who are desperate and helpless is really helping to write their story. In many cases, we decide what the ending of that story will be. Will they live? Will they die? Will they go on enduring the miseries of their past? Or will they have new adventures in a brighter, and kinder future? We have so much power, Much more than most people realize.

Each of the hundreds of animals at our sanctuary has a story to tell. And we are part of the story. Maybe the most important part because we gave them a place to be when no one else would. We gave them hope when they had no reason to hope. We eased their pain and fear, and gave them a future. As rescuers, we touch every life we encounter, some very briefly, and some very deeply. How we choose to help write the endings of stories reveals a lot about us and about the world we want to be living in. Right now, in the midst of the chaos and cruelty of the world, we need to stand united on a path of kindness and decency and love. For all creatures, great and small.

What will the ending be? That is the question that we all have the power to help answer if we choose to exercise our efforts on behalf of others. One story that right now is being written, with no particular ending in sight, involves a humble cat and her babies. Those of us who have been in animal rescue a long time think that they have heard and seen just about everything, but we are often wrong. There are so many twists and turns in life, and we can't always feel confident that we won't see something even more cruel and more horrible or more troubling. But also, we sometimes see things more wonderful and

miraculous than we ever imagined.

One of our volunteers was driving along a country lane between fields. By some miracle, he noticed what appeared to be a small carrying case in the tall grass, almost hidden from sight. Out of curiosity, he stopped to take a look. As he moved closer, he heard a pathetic sound, like a wounded animal. Imagine his surprise when he

finally got to the object: A terrified and starving young cat in a small cage filled with feces and urine. Not only was this animal abandoned, but it was left to die a most horrible death. Because it was caged, the cat could not do anything except wait for death. Dying alone in its filthy coffin.

The cat was terrified. He rushed it to Animals in

Distress, and our volunteers and staff were horrified to realize the condition of the animal but also the fact that she was very pregnant. They cleaned her up as best they could, and we took her to the veterinarian the next day.

Imagine our surprise when the veterinarian said that she was very young, definitely well under a year, and was pregnant with five or six kittens. This poor cat was so thin that it is hard to imagine her being pregnant with anything, let alone that many kittens.

She was made comfortable at our shelter and gave birth, overnight, to six babies. We noticed that she wasn't acting quite like a typical mother cat, and inspected everything more closely. Something seemed horribly wrong with the little kittens. We rushed the mother and the kittens to the veterinarian and were told that for some reason, the umbilical cords of the kittens were intertwined with each other. The mother cat did not know how to handle this situation. We can't even understand how she was able to give birth to six kittens whose umbilical cords were not separate. One possible theory is that the mother cat was squashed into the cage, unable to stand or move

normally. The kittens inside her were, of course, squashed too, causing the umbilical cord to get entwined.

It took the veterinarian and her assistant almost an hour to untangle the cords. Sadly, the cords had wrapped around the kittens' feet and legs, cutting off circulation. This meant that there was significant damage to the limbs of the kittens, and the definite possibility that they could have paralysis or loss of limbs as a result.

How horrifying is the thought of these babies, whose mother was just saved from a miserable fate, having now to go through more trauma. They were just born, innocent and fragile, and all we wanted to do was protect them and help them. Some of us were very overwhelmed by the thought of the struggle facing this little family, and we cried for what the mother had suffered and for what the kittens might suffer.

Sadly, two days after giving birth, Gucci spiked a temperature of over 105 degrees and stopped eating. She and her babies were rushed to the vet, who diagnosed her with a massive infection of her uterus, which was all inflamed. She needed intravenous fluids and antibiotics as well as supportive care. She was unable to nurse her very fragile kittens, so the babies were transferred to skilled foster care.

Despite doing better on the antibiotic, Gucci was still in danger, If the infection flared up again, her uterus could become perforated, spilling infection throughout her body. A decision was made to

Duchess

It's a reality of animal rescue that some animals may be in



the shelter for a long time if they don't get adopted. We never adopt out animals unless the right match is possible, for the welfare of both the animal and the adopting family. Some animals will end their years as our residents. While we would love to see all our rescues in loving forever homes, we know that some animals will live out their days with us.

Such is the case with Duchess, a shepherd mix who was rescued along with her puppies, many years ago. Duchess was chained to an old trailer in the mountains, and had to fight other dogs for the meager food she was given. She was starving, as were her puppies.

As is often the case, the mother was left behind while the babies were adopted. Duchess became more content over the years, knowing she was loved, safe, and well fed. A few of our staff and volunteers have a special fondness for her and make sure she has lots of TLC.

As Duchess has gotten older, she has had some health challenges. Most alarming was a neurological crisis, resulting in a head tilt and some mobility issues. However, she recovered about 80% from that but has arthritic and some mobility challenges. (This is no different than we humans, as we get older!) Our staff helps her on days when she's not as mobile, and never complain about the extra work involved. They rejoice on the days when she is able to get around well, and they keep a close eye on how she is feeling and how well she is eating.

We don't know how much longer Duchess will be with us, but we do know that every day of the rest of her life will be full of love and kindness. That is the promise we make to every animal we rescue. That is our solemn pledge.

Getting old is often seen in our society as devaluing someone's life. So much focus is on looking and acting young, denying the reality of the toll that many decades have taken on our bodies. Some shelters consider any animal over 5 to be close to unadoptable and, therefore, often do not keep those animals around very long.

Here at Animals in Distress, each life has value. Each life deserves respect and love, regardless of age or physical/emotional challenges. One rescue that reflects this is of an elderly cat named Doodle. Doodle's owner suffered from dementia and often would forget to feed the cat, or let her back in the house. This sweet cat would cry and cry on the porch, begging to come in, begging to be fed, begging for a

warm place to sleep, but her owner didn't react.

Finally, neighbors intervened as they saw Doodle's health deteriorating and got the owner to relinquish the cat to Animals in Distress. Neglect and old age had taken its toll on Doodle, and she had renal failure as well as heart and thyroid issues. We got her on supportive care, including fluids several times a week, and Doodle responded. She was happy. She was safe and loved, and she spent a year with us enjoying the best year she had ever known.

Inevitably, Doodle finally couldn't fight her health challenges and passed away in the arms of the people who loved her. She didn't die alone and afraid. She deserved to be loved right up to her last breath. She deserved to be treated with kindness and dignity. She deserved to know what it was to be loved, unconditionally.
