Thanks to an incredible effort by many people, our 2022 WAEB Radiothon—our biggest fundraiser of the year—closed with a total of \$201,108! That is wonderful news. We really needed those funds, since we went into the Radiothon with an operating deficit of over \$200,000. That deficit was and is due to the huge number of animals we are called upon to

help, and the escalating costs of veterinary services and supplies, food, kennel supplies (for example, we go through a mountain of cat litter every month), utilities....well, you know.

We are always deeply moved by the outpouring of love and kindness from so many people. Donors send pledges with the kindest notes. Volunteers schedule their vacations around the Radiothon, and some (many) use precious vacation days so they can help out during Radiothon week. Several businesses, not the least of which is the WAEB/iHeart team, donate services and



items for prizes so that 100% of the funds we raise go directly to animal rescue and care.

Listening to news reports of all the violence and cruelty in the world can be so disheartening. However, when we think of the caring and devoted friends of our shelter/sanctuary, we are reminded that much good and decency still exist in the world. It is so easy to give up sometimes, but giving up is not an option if we want to continue to care for the lives we have saved, and to save even more lives. Some of these animals have gone

through years of pain and desperation, and still they are able to try just one more time; they won't give up, and neither will we and our many wonderful friends.

Thank you. You have made life an option over death; made hope possible; and banished despair. May you and those you care about be blessed with the knowledge that your kindness and support have made a huge difference in this world, and in the lives of hundreds of animals who call Animals in Distress their sanctuary and their home.

Thank You for Lending Many Friendly Paws a Helping Hand!

Every year, we perform several rescues that perfectly embody the importance of our work and of the Radiothon, which raises essential funds to save these lives. This year, we were contacted by a desperate woman whose elderly brother had died, leaving two senior dogs alone in his house. No one in the family could or would take in the dogs. The man's sister travelled a long distance each day to feed the dogs once a day, but she became desperate when the executor of the estate ordered the dogs to be evicted, and he didn't care how. He even said that she should just take them out somewhere and 'dump" them!! She reached out for help from several places and was turned away except to euthanize them. Someone suggested that she call Animals in Distress, and she knew this was her last hope.

At such times, we can't sit around debating what to do. If such animals are to have any chance, they need help right away. No guarantee of outcome, but at least a chance—which is what they would not get elsewhere.

Neither dog had seen a veterinarian for years. The 13 year old Chihuahua, named Flicker

(pictured at left), was in the worst condition: her nails were so long that they curled back into her foot pads, her mouth was so decayed that all her teeth had rotted out or broken off, and a mass the size of a plum hung from her belly. Both dogs were dirty, very underweight, and in need of help. Worst of all, Flicker was in kidney failure and had to be hospitalized. We still don't know if she will survive, but we are hopeful. We will give you an update in the next newsletter.

The other dog is a 10 year old terrier mix named Chloe. She is in similar condition but is not as critical since she is not exhibiting signs of kidney failure. Both dogs are very sweet and trusting, and they appreciate being fed and treated with such kindness.

As you can see, the donations we get from all of YOU are the difference between pain and death, or life and hope, for animals like these. **That help comes from people like YOU.**

Nominations for the Board:
