Thanks to all who participated in this year's Blessing of the Animals in honor of the feast day of Saint Francis of Assisi. Sadly, animals were not considered as worthy of care or kindness in centuries past by certain religions and societies. They were abused, killed, neglected, and left to starve to death.

Saint Francis took a different view of the situation. He felt that all creatures great and small deserved the same compassion and love and care that humans did. He truly was remarkable in going against his own faith and society. But sometimes, the heart knows more than any institution does. Sometimes, we follow our hearts because we know doing anything else will put a cancer on our souls. The result of his compassion is that today, we honor his feast day as a way of reminding everyone that animals are indeed a blessing.

We want to thank Dr. Steve Myers for officiating at the blessing. Steve and his wife Karen had adopted a dog from us

many years ago, who was much loved. For almost every year for almost 28 years, Sharon Grant O'Connor has come all the way from Delaware to provide music. Sharon and her husband Danny have rescued so many animals in Delaware that we're not even sure of the exact count right now.

These are the kind of people who not only participate in the Blessing, but who know what the Blessing is all about. They know that human life without animals would be sad and lonely for many people.

We also want to thank the volunteers who organized the event, providing homemade food and refreshments for everyone.

A special part of the program this year was the dedication of a collage of medals and ribbons put together by Denise Schaffer. Denise adopted a border collie pup named Eli from us over a



decade ago. Eli, typical of his breed, required lots of mental and physical activity, and Denise did an outstanding job of getting Eli into agility and other doggy activities. Eli became a champion and accumulated so many ribbons and medals that they would fill a whole room.

Eli and Denise have attended almost all of our events since she adopted

him. We have countless photos of Eli hanging out, wearing costumes, participating with other dogs, and in general being part of our family here at the shelter. Sadly, Eli passed away recently.

When Denise presented us with a framed collage displaying some of Eli's medals and ribbons, we decided that we would hang it in a prominent place in our Hospitality Center. Eli was a shelter dog. He was a rescue. He was a bit challenging as a puppy and probably would've been put down or abused if he hadn't come to us. And here he was... Champion, a gentleman in fur, and a wonderful example of the potential in animals that are given a second chance because of the people who support our work. Without such people, who believe in giving discarded animals a second chance, animals like Eli and Madeline would have not had a chance to live.

Perhaps, the best thing we can do in honor of these wonderful rescued animals is to go on rescuing animals.

Many thanks to all the volunteers who did the set-up, planning, and food preparation. Thanks to those who donated food and prizes (Robin Levan made fabulous


desserts), to those who collected sponsorship donations, and to those who actually participated either with or without a pet.

Veterans Day is November 11

One of the areas of service that is often overlooked is the incredible contribution and sacrifice of millions of animals.

Horses and dogs are

the most well-known, but many other species of animals have also served in various ways. Books have been written about that topic, and some of them are included in the Garden of Heroes display at our shelter. We created the Garden of Heroes several years ago to remind people that we have a debt we can never repay to all the animals who have saved millions of lives through their military, police, fire detection, search and rescue, and many other areas of service.

We are a society that is still killing millions of innocent animals, simply because people are irresponsible and thoughtless. We need to be reminded as a society that animals have served us not only personally and emotionally, but they have provided us with unconditional love, protection, and companionship, when the world has turned its back on us. They have also saved the lives of thousands of soldiers and emergency responders, as well as finding lost and terrified people, often losing their own lives in the process.

One of our most loyal volunteers over the years was Les Miller, who served as a sonar man in the Navy. Les was proud of his military service and always reflected the dignity and dedication

of those who have served selflessly to protect their country and all of us. Les and his wife, Cheryl adopted a dog from us named Madeline. Madeline was abandoned with all her puppies, and the little family was starving to death. Animals in Distress rescued all of them, and found homes for all the puppies and then eventually for Madeline.

When Les passed away, Madeline never forgot him. Les's wife Cheryl shared a couple of pictures with us that we wanted to share with our friends. One picture shows Madeline

at Les's grave. And the other picture shows her in front of the chair that he sat in. She simply can't understand why he's not there anymore.

We must make sure that those who have served our country are not forgotten or overlooked. And that includes all the animals who have saved countless lives through bomb detection, search and rescue, and so many other areas of service. Our Garden of Heroes at Animals in Distress is our way of acknowledging their service. We must never forget them.

A former name for what we now call Veterans Day is Remembrance Day. It is so important for all of us, despite all the craziness of the world around us, to pause and think about those who have served us, including all the animals that have saved countless lives. We can never repay the debts that we owe to those who served selflessly and often gave their lives to save the lives of others.
