## Kayla Now Enjoys Walking

If you know anything about cats, you know how important their claws are for exercise, mobility, and well-being. Cats, by their very nature, are dependent on the claws and toes on their feet for their balance, their mobility, and their safety. When anything happens to affect the health and welfare of their feet and claws. they are in serious troubleand, usually, significant pain.


We received a desperate call for help from a woman in Texas. Her brother had died unexpectedly, and her brother's 10 year old cat was locked in the apartment with no one to care for it. Due to the distance and logistical issues, the situation was getting desperate. So, we decided to help the poor cat before it starved to death—or the landlord threw it out in the street as he had been threatening to do.

What we discovered was a cat whose feet were grotesque. The nails had not been trimmed back in a very long time. The apartment had no furniture or bedding in it, and the cat was unable to claw a surface that would help wear down



its claws. Some of the nails had curled around and around into the foot of the cat. Other nails were super enlarged, making it next to impossible for the cat to walk paws. The amount of pain and discomfort that animal must have endured for years defies description.

In addition, the cat, named Kayla, also had significant damaged and rotting teeth and infected, painful gums. Clearly, this poor animal did not know what it was like to be without pain for many years. Every step it took, each time it tried to eat—just the thought causes us

Here is a picture of Kayla, sleeping peacefully in our cat kennel, without pain or discomfort. Her owner obviously was on hard times for many years, but he must have loved his cat. He just couldn't do better for her. We hope he can see her, wherever he is, and know that Kayla is being taken care of and is in a safe, loving place. Kayla was with him until he took his last breath, and we are amazed that she has been able to survive such trauma, pain, and hardship and still stay a sweet, affectionate, and trusting soul.

## Good News

In last month's newsletter, we featured the theme of bonded pairs of animals who had to be adopted out together. We are very happy to report that one of the bonded pairs, brother and sister shihtzus Chloe and Ozzy, were adopted by a loving family who had never had two dogs

at the same time. The two dogs are enjoying their new home and the beautiful garden lovingly tended to by the couple.

Also, Mocha, a German shepherd mix who had been with us for 4 years, was adopted from us in January. She returned for Alumni Day and looked so happy and content. You could tell how much she loves our shelter staff and volunteers because she was so happy to see them. BUT she was also happy to go home with her very special family.

Sometimes, we think that the biggest gift we can give to our rescued animals, in addition to

love and a safe place to be, is TIME. It takes time to heal, time to trust, and, in both of these cases, time to find a forever home. Time for someone to see how wonderful they are. Time to be discovered.

Those who support our work have given animals like these the gift of life, the gift of hope, and the gift of time.



Imagine how surprised a work crew was at a construction site, when they were getting ready to start up a big piece of machinery, and discovered five tiny kittens huddled in the bowels of the machine. Had they not seen those kittens before they started the machine, the poor kittens would've suffered a horrible death.

When we rescued those kittens, they smelled of machine oil. There was no sign of the mother cat, and the kittens were way too young to survive on their own. Construction sites are very dangerous places for people, and also for animals. It's very possible the mother was killed by one of the large machines. Anyway, emergency measures were in order, so Kelly Hartnett took the kittens home with her to feed them every couple of hours around the clock until Rose was able to get the kittens into her foster care. We are very pleased to say that all five kittens have survived, and they actually attended our Alumni Day. We had them in our office, so

they wouldn't get too much activity, but invited people to come and look at the babies. Nothing speaks louder about the value of our life saving work than looking, face-to-face, at the animals who have been saved. So many of them had special needs and were in crisis of some kind. So many of them would not have survived except for Animals in Distress and all the people who make our work possible.

One kind deed leads to another, and Rose, who works at Renaissance Senior Homes, recently took the kittens to work and shared them with some of the elderly residents there. Many of them had pets years ago, and holding a tiny kitten in their hands brings back all the sweet memories of pets they had before.













A nice elderly woman who had been feeding stray cats in her area, showed up with a cat whose tail had been bitten through the bone, and part of its tail had already fallen off. The nice lady had been feeding a colony of outdoor cats and had already taken this female to be spayed and gotten her vaccines. Now the poor cat, who she named PawPaw, was in serious trouble. Our veterinarian said that PawPaw is only about a year old and very friendly. The lady who had been feeding the stray cats had taken her to an emergency vet hospital, but she could not afford the thousands of dollars to amputate the tail. She was heartbroken. She couldn't let the cat suffer, and she could not afford thousands in vet care, and she was unable to add PawPaw to her household of cats that she had already rescued. In addition, the lady has many health issues. Her only option was to euthanize the cat so at least it didn't suffer anymore.

Our veterinarian examined PawPaw and despite the miserable condition of the cat, she did not even have to



sedate PawPaw to evaluate her wounds and figure out how to proceed. Obviously, amputation would be required along with follow up antibiotics and pain medication and wound dressings.

PawPaw returned to the shelter for a short time, but a recheck showed that the tail was still rotting away. So a second surgery was needed to remove all but about an inch of her tail.

PawPaw is recovering very well and has been at the Veterinary Hospital so long, and has become so attached to the staff there, and is so friendly to everybody, that they have

offered to adopt her. She will no longer be living out on the streets, a victim vulnerable to whatever misery comes her way.

There are many kind and decent people in the world, but we don't hear about most of them. It is so easy to get disheartened and frustrated and depressed when listening to all of the cruelty and violence and antagonism in the news cycle. In contrast: Here is an example of good news, of caring people, and a life saved from misery and suffering. These kinds of stories do not have happy

PawPaw represents all the shelter and rescued cats who just need a chance. They just need a friend who will help them through their tough times. PawPaw also reflects all the cats who are living out there now, who are not truly feral cats. They are just pets who have been betrayed by their owners.
