The Wind Beneath Our Wings

Animal rescue is one of the most satisfying and one of the most devastating things a person can do. Seeing an animal whose life has been treated with such disdain and ignorance by cruel people become whole and happy is like receiving the Nobel prize. It makes you feel wonderful. It makes you feel as if you can do something about the suffering in the world. It makes you feel as if you matter. And that animal's life matters.

And then there is the dark side to animal rescue. Obviously, knowing you can't save them all is part of the darkness. But the real crushing aspect is when you try very hard to save an animal, and you can't. Its injuries are too far gone, and the animal whose life you wanted to save slowly passes away. Nothing more to be done. You did everything you could, but it just wasn't enough.

It's at this point in animal rescue that some people start to burn out. They become devastated by the sadness of the loss, and they finally decide that the pain is too much. This is something that almost everyone involved in animal rescue experiences at one point or another.

After the Radiothon, we went through this experience with some kittens. We're going to share this with you to give you a glimpse into the world that we live in every day.



We will begin with little Ava. Ava came to us in horrible shape. Both eyes had definitely ruptured. She had difficulty breathing which turned out to be due to fluid in her lungs. She was full of ticks and fleas and was kept in the hospital to give her the best chance of surviving. The Hospital staff was so happy when she started to perk up. Even her breathing improved, and she seemed more relaxed. She liked when the staff sang to her. Just a tiny little soul. She was too weak to have the surgery to remove the damaged eye tissue, but everyone was hopeful that she would make it. The next morning, however she had passed away. Kittens are very tiny, and sometimes there is a bit of an improvement before they crash and die. These are the difficult cases because despite everybody's best efforts, we couldn't save that little life.

There's something about holding a life in the palm of your hand and promising that you will save it. And then not being able to do so. This little kitten, this little soul, its life didn't matter to many people. But it mattered to us. Sadly, caring wasn't enough.

Then there is another kitten we named Kimmy. She was hanging out with a group of abandoned cats in a country farm area. The kind lady who was trying to feed these animals noticed that Kimmy was in trouble. The kitten was just lying in her driveway, not moving. Her eyes were infected, and she was in danger of losing her sight. She also had a very bad upper respiratory infection and struggled to breathe. She weighed only 1.6 pounds, which is way less than a 6-7 week old kitten should weigh. Imagine being blind and sick and only about six or seven weeks old if that. And nobody is helping you. You can't find food. You can't really do much to defend yourself. You're dying. Alone. When she came in, she ate a little, but then stopped eating. So one of our volunteers took her home and syringe fed her small amounts of food all night. We didn't know if she was going to make it, but the next day, she perked up a little. It's like her whole will to live had been jump started. Kimmy continues to improve but still has chest congestion and damaged eyes. But she's alive, and playing, and purring, and HAPPY!





Here is a picture of Kimmy sleeping soundly with food in her belly and a soft place to rest her body. Just think of her fate if we did not rescue her. Whatever the future holds for her, she will always be loved and cared for. She will not starve or suffer or wander alone and afraid in her blindness.

That is the promise we make to every animal we rescue.

Kenny was rescued because the woman who had been feeding a group of stray cats noticed that this tiny kitten had lost a leg. She didn't know what happened, But it was an urgent situation. He was loaded with fleas that were sucking all his blood out, and his fur was caked with the debris of the dried up blood all over his body. When we gave him a bath, the water ran red. We estimated him at about four weeks of age, which is very tiny. Once the scab was off of the wound, the flesh underneath was very raw. Kenny was taken to the emergency room, where he was given some antibiotics. No one is sure how he lost his leg. It could've been an animal bite or sliced off somehow or tangled in a wire or caught in a trap. We will never know what happened. We hope no one was so evil as to cut his leg off. Imagine this little kitten weighing only .6 pounds. He'd already been through hell. And very starved and malnourished, of course.



We named the kitten Kenny, after the very sick husband of the woman who brought the kitten to us. The kitten was dehydrated and didn't even want to eat or drink. His body was shutting down. Kenny was on the verge of passing away. One of our volunteers took Kenny home and kept offering him drops of nutrition periodically all through the night. By the next morning, Kenny seemed a little perkier. This volunteer is an experienced foster mother for tiny kittens. She understands how fragile the situation is, so she continues to foster him.

Kenny has survived so far. What the future holds, as more medical information is obtained, is unknown. What we do know is that Kenny now has a chance.

None of these rescues is possible without the help of the people who support our work. No matter how much we want to, no matter how hard we try, no matter how hard the veterinarians try, the bottom line is that we need the support of our friends. It's difficult to lose a kitten like Ava. It's difficult to fail to save a life in any rescue attempt. But knowing that we could possibly save that life and not having the resources to do so would be devastating beyond words.

We can regroup our effort after losing Ava because of the knowledge and belief that we <u>will</u> be able to save others. We save them in her honor and her memory. We save them to honor the memory of all those we couldn't save.

This belief in the power of trying is how most of us keep doing animal rescue. The failure would be if we couldn't try. The sadness would be in knowing we could've done something and we didn't try. Or we didn't have the resources to try. Or we didn't have the will to try.

If there is one message that we want this essay to stress, it is that your love, support, and prayers are the wind beneath our wings. Thank you for making these rescues possible.

Thank you for giving us the chance to save more lives.


